IGNITE Christmas planning: We met again on 21st September for the next phase of our Christmas planning, and it was great to come together from across five churches to share ideas. We've produced a joint Christmas flyer with all of our Christmas services, and we were able to share this on Remembrance Sunday. Production of our Advent packs is well underway and these will be shared for the first time across all five churches, and with some of our primary schools. Exploring Hymns: (Vicky Gray writes) Over four weeks, a group of us met in St Dunstan's Hall to hear a short talk about a particular phase in Anglican hymnody. We started with the Reformation, then looked at the Wesley brothers' hymns from the 18th century, before moving onto the Victorians (who still dominate our hymnbooks) and finally to the 20th century. After each talk, we sang a hymn and then discussed it. At the end of each session, we sang the hymn again as our closing prayer. The church has always held old and new in tension, but I hope 'Exploring Hymns' has encouraged us to see the merits of both. Thanks to all those who came and sang!
